Albany Mayor Pro Tem Chad E. Warbington Elected to MEAG Power Board

Three members of the MEAG Power Board are elected each year at the MEAG Power Annual Meeting, which took place July 12. Warbington was elected to a three-year term on the nine-member Board. Acworth Alderman L. Timothy Houston, Sr., and Monroe businessman Gregory P. Thompson were re-elected to new terms on the Board.

At the Board meeting in which Warbington was seated, new Board officers were elected: Former Calhoun Utilities General Manager Larry M. Vickery, Chairman; L. Timothy Houston, Sr., Vice Chairman, and Patrick C. Bowie, Jr., LaGrange Utility Director, Secretary-Treasurer.
